

What is DVIP?

DVIP is a Domestic Violence Intervention Program designed for individuals who have threatened or used violence against a current or former intimate partner or spouse.

DVIP is a year-long program consisting of group counseling and education. The program includes 26 weekly sessions followed by 6 monthly follow-up sessions.

Our goal is to help participants learn alternatives to violence by providing an opportunity to examine behaviors, attitudes and beliefs.

DVIP participants will look at:

Abusive behavior	· stopping it
Responsibility	taking it
Conflict	resolving it
Power	managing it
Relationships	. improving them

Principles

All people have a right to live a life free of violence.

Violence has harmful effects on everyone – men, women, and especially children exposed to it.

Violence is a learned behavior, and it can be unlearned. Violence is reinforced by our society and can be passed on from generation to generation.

Violence is a choice. People can choose to deal with their personal issues and express their feelings in a non-violent way.

People are 100% responsible for their own behaviors. Being "provoked" by someone does not justify violence.

The process of becoming non-abusive involves the realization that people only have power and control over themselves – not over other people. Personal power comes from choosing to act responsibly.

Joining the DVIP Program

To enroll in DVIP, call Intake at Family Service of the Piedmont at (336) 387-6161, within the time frame of your court order.

Our staff will schedule your orientation session and discuss fees.

During the DVIP orientation, we will:

- hear more about participants' situations and answer any questions;
- provide an overview of the program;
- assign participants to one of our morning, afternoon or evening groups.
